

I have an animal related concern – Should I contact the CVBC?

The CVBC is responsible for the regulation of the veterinary profession and is able to respond to complaints or concerns related to:

- the conduct or competency of a veterinarian
- questions regarding the registration status of a veterinarian
- the conditions of a veterinary practice facility
- a non-veterinarian or an unlicensed veterinarian performing services that fall within the scope of veterinary medicine.

To report an animal in distress (farm animals, domestic animals and wildlife), please call the BC SPCA Animal Helpline: <u>1-855-622-7722</u>, open 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., seven days per week. Closed on Statutory holidays *except for wildlife calls in the South Vancouver Island Region (Wild ARC) from 8 to 4:30 p.m.*

If this is an animal emergency outside of these hours, please contact your <u>local police</u> <u>department</u>, <u>RCMP</u> or the <u>Conservation Officer Service (RAPP)</u>.

Animal Health and Disease Control:

For <u>animal health</u> related matters that may impact other animals or humans but do not involve concerns regarding the conduct or competency of your veterinarian:

Reportable disease and foreign animal disease concerns or testing questions: Animal owners, veterinarians and laboratories are required to immediately report to the CFIA and the Chief Veterinarian of BC (CVO BC) when a reportable or foreign animal disease (FAD) is detected or suspected.

Concerns regarding wildlife that appear sick or injured:

- Do not touch the animal
- Contact the BC Wildlife Veterinarian (250-953-4285)
- If you find an animal which is injured or orphaned (and not likely to be rabid), contact a wildlife rehabilitation centre

Criminal Conduct:

If you have concerns regarding the conduct of a veterinarian that involve conduct issues that fall under the Criminal Code you may file a complaint with the CVBC, but are strongly encouraged to report the incident to your local police or RCMP.
